



Providing Children with Basic Needs – Diapers

MASSCAP, and its partner organizations, advocate for a statewide diaper program, providing free diapers to low-income children and families, plugging a glaring gap in the social safety net.

Overview

For low-income families, diapers are a basic need that often goes unmet — With an estimated 19.2% of MA households with children that are food insecure, diapers often take a backseat, and families are unable to keep up with the costly necessity of roughly 8-10 diapers per day. A recent study found that 36% of MA families with young children could not afford enough diapers during the pandemic even with federal stimulus payouts. This can lead to missed days of work and school and an increased likelihood of painful rashes and infections.

Throughout MASSCAP's recent federal diaper pilot program (via the Office of Community Services of the Department of Health and Human Services), 15 distribution sites, including both Community Action Agencies (CAAs) and diaper banks, have provided free monthly diaper pickups to enrolled families for the last 18 months. By providing diapers, clients reported being able to pay bills, stay in school, and cover other expenses which would have fallen to the wayside without this support.

Program Evaluation – Initial Caregiver Data

MASSCAP has partnered with Children's HealthWatch to analyze data from client surveys and focus groups. Preliminary info below; further analysis forthcoming.



55% lacked enough diapers to adequately change children



11.5% of children had diaper rash that required medical attention due to lack of diapers



15% reported children missing childcare due to lack of diapers



51% experienced stress over being able to afford diapers



7% reported having to miss work due to lack of diapers



54% experienced struggles to have enough diapers
